Getting back to our collegiate roots

CHENEY – Homecoming. What comes to mind when you hear that word? Football, bonfires, campus competitions, decorations, school spirit, and parties. As a proud graduate of Eastern Washington University (class of 1985) from the Radio and Television Department within the School of Communication, homecoming brings back a flood of memories.

After graduating from Cheney High School, attending Eastern seemed like the logical choice, as many of my friends had done the same. During my freshman year, homecoming burst onto the scene as a major event, with activities all over campus. I remember thinking, "What's all the excitement about?" I hadn't paid much attention to it when I was a Blackhawk, but now, as an Eagle, the buzz of homecoming was

infectious.

To me, homecoming was all about a big celebration for students, culminating in a football game. Even now, I can't recall who we played or whether we won. It wasn't until I returned to Cheney while serving in the U.S. Navy that I truly understood the meaning of "Homecoming."

Eastern, or Cheney Normal School as it was once called, held its first homecoming football game in 1923. The name "homecoming" stemmed from the fact that alumni were invited back to campus to relive their school days and reunite with old friends, many of whom they hadn't seen in years.

For alumni, homecoming is a reunion—a chance to reconnect with former classmates and watch the Eags take on a Big Sky opponent. Some alumni will stop by Eagles Pub (formerly Showies) for a beer, walk around campus, and marvel at the changes. "What happened to Patterson Hall?" they might ask, or "Where's the bookstore?" To their surprise, there are no textbooks anymore!

The campus has changed a lot since our time, and many of my fellow alumni would be amazed at how different it looks today. For those of us who were here in the '70s and '80s, there's no MayFest with bands playing on campus anymore, but if you look closely, you'll still find something that brings back strong memories. You'll feel the same excitement you had as a freshman, as I do when I think of helping a friend run for student body council or standing in line at Isle Hall to rush through the small bookstore.

Do you remember registering for classes in the basement of Showalter Hall? We used to call it the "Showalter Shuffle." I could go on, but I hope I've sparked some memories for you as you think back on your own time at Eastern.

Homecoming isn't just about

a football game. It's for us—the alumni—who dedicated our time not only to earning an education but to forming strong bonds with our classmates. It's a chance to remember the final time we were together, at our graduation ceremony in Reese Court, passing around a champagne bottle in the back row before heading off to collect our degrees.

I'm proud of the accomplishments of my fellow graduates whether it's a classmate who became one of the Breakfast Boys on Zoo FM, another who wrote for Bill Nye the Science Guy, or someone I didn't think would make it, but went on to host one of the nation's top sports talk shows. And then there's me, making my own small mark as mayor of Cheney, and having my voice still used on a radio station in Diego Garcia to this day.

Homecoming is about returning to our roots. It's a time to come back to where it all started, as proud Eagles. Go Eags!

Game could be thriller based on past close calls

CHENEY – Eastern Washington University Eagles will be taking on University of California Davis Aggies, ranked #14 according to the Football Championship Subdivision poll, this Saturday at 4 p.m.

The Eagles are itching for a win and this game could be it despite the ranking of Aggies.

Games between the Aggies and Eagles have often been highscoring, dramatic affairs. One of the most thrilling came in 2018 when Eastern, ranked #5 at the time, defeated Davis 59-20. What made the game exciting was the battle for Big Sky Conference supremacy, as both teams were vying for a top playoff seed. Eagle's offense exploded, with quarterback Eric Barriere leading a relentless aerial attack, securing a decisive victory.

In 2019, the tables turned when Davis edged out Eastern in a 34-29 win. The game was a nail-



biter, featuring lead changes and a dramatic fourth quarter. The Aggies capitalized on key turnovers and held off a late Eagle rally to clinch the upset.

Another intense matchup occurred in 2021, when Eastern claimed a 38-20 win. Davis came out strong early, but the game took a dramatic shift in the second half, with Eagle's explosive offense breaking through. Eric Barriere's passing and timely defensive stops sealed the win, adding another chapter to the rivalry.

These games have solidified the Davis-Eastern matchup as one full of unpredictability, explosive plays, and thrilling finishes.





Bed races and bonfire are memorable traditions

CHENEY – Eastern Washington University is set to host its annual Bed Races and Bonfire, two time-honored traditions that showcase the vibrant spirit of Homecoming. The festivities will kick off on Oct. 17 at 6 p.m.

The pep rally will feature appearances by Swoop, Eastern's mascot, along with performances from the cheer squad and marching band. Members of the soccer, volleyball, and football teams will also be in attendance, and lucky participants may even walk away with some special swag.

The Bonfire serves as both a community gathering and a pep rally, igniting school spirit before the highly anticipated football game against UC Davis. The fire symbolizes unity and burns away any lingering doubts or challenges ahead of the big game.

The Bed Races bring teams of students to downtown Cheney, where they will push creatively decorated, wheeled beds in a fast-paced and entertaining competition. This quirky event, which takes place on 1st Street, blends speed with creativity, and the city will close off a section of the road to accommodate this lively tradition. Teams, often decked out in costumes matching their bed themes, will race through the course in a blend of friendly competition and fun.

The race consists of teams of five that will compete in a doubleelimination tournament. The fastest teams will advance through the rounds until a champion is crowned, with the winners earning bragging rights that last a lifetime.

The races will begin at 7 p.m. on 1st Street, following a pep rally and bonfire at 6 p.m. at the corner of G and 1st Streets.

The tradition of linking Cheney's downtown with Eastern during Homecoming has long been a collaborative effort between the city and the university. The shared goal of fostering a stronger bond led to the creation of this event, which is now a hallmark of Homecoming weekend. Down-



town Cheney provides the perfect backdrop for both the Bed Races and the Bonfire, which is held just two blocks from the racecourse, in a parking lot at the corner of G and 1st Streets. Together, the Bed Races and Bonfire bring together students, alumni, and the Cheney community, making Homecoming one of the most memorable and anticipated events of the year at Eastern.


